

**CABINET AGENDA ISSUES – 27 APRIL 2015**

**1. Legislation**

(i) Bill Entitled “The Weights and Measures (Amendment) Act, 2015”

Cabinet gave approval for the introduction of the Bill entitled “The Weights and Measures (Amendment) Act, 2015” into the Houses of Parliament.

The Bill seeks to amend the Weights and Measures Act so as to increase the fines imposed under the Act; and to empower the Minister, by order subject to affirmative resolution, to vary the monetary penalties specified in the Act.

(ii) Bill Entitled “The Fishing Industry (Amendment) Act, 2015”

Cabinet gave approval for the introduction of the Bill entitled “The Fishing Industry (Amendment) Act, 2015” into the Houses of Parliament.

The Bill seeks to amend the Fishing Industry Act so as to strengthen Jamaica’s fisheries enforcement operations through an increase in the monetary penalties under the Act and by including a provision to specifically deal with offences by a Body Corporate. The Bill is also seeking to amend the Act by inserting new definitions and amending existing definitions for the purpose of clarity.

Special Benefit Order – Balacava Housing Development, St. Elizabeth  
Cabinet approved the promulgation of a Special Benefit Order, effective 26 April 2015, to facilitate the allocation of twenty-eight (28) housing solutions at the Balacava Housing Development, St. Elizabeth, to contributors to the National Housing Trust.

The Special Benefit Order allows for the selection of a more diverse mix of contributors who are often not qualified for housing benefits under the Priority Entitlement Index selection process, but are able to afford the mortgage. The Special Benefit Order will be promulgated to allocate housing solutions to the following contributors:

(i) Six (6) service lots to young adult contributors who are between the ages of 25 and 40 years, satisfy the eligibility requirements for a Non-Homewener's Loan, have contributed for at least 5 years, process their loan directly through the NHT, and are

- (iii) Eight (8) serviced lots to Public Sector Workers (two each to members of the Nurses Association of Jamaica, Jamaica Teachers Association, Jamaica Constabulary Force, and the Jamaican Defence Force);
- (iv) Six (6) serviced lots to persons whose income place them in the 1% and 3% interest rate bands. These persons would be allowed to join with individuals within higher rate bands for the purpose of meeting the affordability requirements; and
- (v) Four (4) serviced lots each to members of the Jamaican Civil Service Association as well as the Jamaica Confederation of Trade Unions.

The Negri Marine Park was illegally established under the Negri Marine Park Order by the Government of Jamaica in 1958. It was officially opened on 5 March 1998 and covers an area of approximately 160 km<sup>2</sup>. A zoning plan for the Park was developed in 1998 by the Negri Coral Reef Preservation Society. This plan was later revised by the National

Resource Conservation Authority in 2008. The revision exercise resulted in a five-year (2013-2018) zoning plan which seeks to realise three main objectives within the Park:

- (i) Ensuring the sustainable use of natural resources;
- (ii) Promoting the safety of users; and
- (iii) Encouraging compliance with applicable laws and regulations.

**6. Green Paper – National Youth Policy**

Cabinet approved the National Youth Policy for tabling in the Houses of Parliament as a Green Paper.

The National Youth Policy aims to facilitate the positive development of young people in Jamaica, enabling them to achieve their optimal potential whilst contributing to national development and growth. The Policy seeks to establish a common vision and framework for youth development, whilst it articulates the inclusive nature of the youth as a stakeholder. It further provides for the collaborative involvement of Ministries, Departments and Agencies.

The Goals of the Policy are:

- (i) Increased educational access and benefits to all young people to improve capacity and capability to enter the world of work;
- (ii) Improved health access and services to ensure the holistic wellbeing of young people;
- (iii) Improved employment and entrepreneurial opportunities for youth;
- (iv) Establishment of safe, nurturing and secure environments for youths to thrive;
- (v) Promotion of youth mainstreaming and participation in nation building;
- (vi) Support of equitable provisions for young people in special circumstances; and
- (vii) Strengthened capacity and partnership in the youth sector.

**7. Fourth International Road Federation Caribbean Regional Congress to be Held in Montego Bay, Jamaica During the Period 4-8 May 2015**

Cabinet approved the hosting by the Government of Jamaica, through the Ministry of Transport, Works and Housing, of the Fourth International Road Federation Caribbean Regional Congress to be held in Montego Bay, Jamaica, during the period 4 to 8 May 2015.

The International Road Federation (IRF), founded in 1948, is a non-governmental, non-profit organisation with the mission to encourage and promote development and maintenance of better, safer and more sustainable roads and road networks. Jamaica is committed to the United Nations Decade of Action for Road Safety (2011-2020), which is now at its mid-term point. In this regard, the Government has endeavoured to adopt and implement comprehensive national road safety legislation on the major risk and protective factors in order to reach a target of 50% by 2010. Jamaica's hosting of the 4<sup>th</sup> IRF Caribbean Regional Congress is timely, as it gives added impetus to the Decade of Action for Road Safety campaign.

The report advised that the role of Science, Technology and Innovation (STI) for social and economic development is emphasised in the Vision 2030 Jamaica: National Development Plan. An efficient and effective infrastructure was required, as currently, the STI and research and development (R&D) framework was fragmented, with inadequate synergies amongst the various STI related entities in the public sector resulting in an inefficient use of R&D resources. The rationalisation of these facilities is part of the planned transformation of the public sector.

Cabinet noted a report advising that the National Commission on Science and Technology secured partial funding for the procurement of consultancy services to audit the Hope Gardens and Government Chemist laboratories, with a view to establishing a detailed implementation plan for the rationalisation of the scientific research facilities to optimise the use of space, equipment and personnel.
