## COMMISSION'S REPORTS DISTRIBUTION LIST FOR SEPTEMBER

### Case Summary

The complainant, DW reported that on January 5, 2014 about 3:00 p.m. while in cell area custody at the May Pen Police Station on a traffic related warrant he was told to get up by a police. He told her that he was not getting up and she kicked him, grabbed him in the front of his shirt tearing it and hit him with a wooden baton to the left side of his face causing a wound. He was taken to the May Pen Hospital where he received four stitches. He was later charged for Assault.

However, the police allege that on the day in question, the complainant refused to exit the Holding Area and was physically and verbally aggressive towards the police officers. He assaulted W/Cons by pushing her who attempted to remove him from the Holding Area. In fear, she retrieved a baton and tried to remove the complainant from the cell, but he resisted and tightly squeezed her hand which held the baton. She managed to break free of his hold and hit him with the baton. The complainant received a wound to his face. He was taken to the hospital where he was treated. The complainant attempted to throw a chair at her and had to be subdued by a Constable. The police revealed that throughout the altercation the complainant hurled expletives and threatening remarks to the officers.

The Complainant, LB alleges that on the July 6, 2015, while at the football field in Greenwich Farm, two police officers alighted from a Hilux pick up van, chased him across the field to the bushy area behind the theatre and fired twice in his direction. After the explosions, he felt an injury to his lower back.

To date, the Commission has been unable to identify the alleged police officers despite numerous attempts to identify the same.

The complainant, Mr. RC alleges that on March 25, 2017 about 12am he was walking along the Borough Bridge Main Road when a vehicle with the driver's door open approached him. For that reason, he ran but then he realized that it was a police service vehicle so he stopped. Two police officers approached him. Sergeant draped him by his shirt and searched him. After he was searched, the other officer sprayed him in the face with pepper spray. The officer then pushed him away then they (the officers) went into the jeep.

The police however allege that they saw the complainant walking alone along Borough Bridge Main Road and stopped at his feet because he seemed suspicious. Sergeant requested a search of his person but the man became aggressive. Constable exited the service vehicle to assist Sergeant to calm the man down. The man continued behaving aggressively while Sgt. held on to him. This caused Constable to spray his pepper spray once in the direction of the complainant with the view of subduing him. The officers placed the complainant to sit in the back of the service vehicle for a while, warned the man of prosecution, however the complainant ran away in the nearby bushes.

This investigation concerns an inmate and a correctional officer. The complainant, KC alleges that on the 1st of June, 2014 about 12:55 pm at the St. Catherine Adult Correctional Centre a correctional officer kicked him in his stomach, he lost his balance and fell to the ground. He then got up used a wire in his cell to defend himself. He threatened the correctional officer, who used a baton hit him behind his left ear. He was brought to surgery for medical attention.

The police however allege that the complainant was armed with a weapon and behaving in a boisterous and violent manner on Gibraltar 4 Section of the facility. During that time CO 1 intervened assisted by CO 2 and force was used to subdue inmate KC. The weapon was subsequently retrieved and KC received treatment for his injuries at the facility.

The concerned correctional officer, CO 1 resigned in August, 2014.

The complainant, Mr. SL alleges that on March 17, 2018 in Annotto Bay Square, while standing at his taxi Toyota Isis motor car, he was approached by Constable who requested his documents and licence. He gave him his licence and informed him that he did not have the documents for the car, as the owner has it. The officer took his licence and walked away with it. In an effort to retrieve his licence, he followed Constable "chucked him", kicked his feet causing him to fall then a tussle ensued. He was taken to the Annotto Bay Police Station, where he was charged. At the station, when he tried to contact his lawyer, Constable hit him in the face causing his mouth to bleed.

The concerned officer however alleges that on March 17, 2018, he approached the complainant's taxi motor car because he was in breach of the Road Traffic Act. He requested the documents for the said motor car and his driver's licence, but the driver only gave him his licence indicating that the owner had the documents. He informed the driver of certain traffic related offences then walked away with his licence with the view of giving him a ticket. The driver followed him, and in a boisterous manner commanded that he return his licence to him. The man also pointed his finger at him and uttered curse words at him. He tried to evade the man, but the man prevented him from doing so. The man then held on to his hand and in effort to release his hold, they fell to the ground. He was eventually assisted by two police officers. The driver was taken to the police station and charged for Assault Occasioning Bodily Harm and Malicious Destruction of Property.

Mr. SL died on July 16, 2018 at the Spanish Town Public Hospital.

The complainants, AB and NB alleges that on September 28, 2015, they were involved in a verbal altercation with a male police officer at Evergreen Sports Bar where the officer uttered expletives to them. During the incident, the said police officer draped her son, RG and pointed a firearm in his face.

To date, the Commission has been unable to identify the alleged police officers despite numerous attempts to identify the same.

The complainant, DC alleges that on September 5, 2015 at about 9:30pm while driving a white and blue Toyota Coaster bus along Molyne's Road, he was involved in an accident with an unmarked service vehicle.

In a further statement dated March 23, 2016, Mr. Clarke indicated that on September 7, 2015 he visited the Matilda's Corner Police Station where both vehicles involved in the accident were being examined by a certified motor vehicle examiner. He took pictures of the vehicle that collided with the Coaster bus. He made checks of the licence plate with the assistance of some colleagues and was informed that the licence plates did not belong to the vehicle on which it was being used. Consequently, he is asking INDECOM to investigate the alleged fraud by the police.

The nature of the complaint however does not fall within the remit of the Commission. The Commission undertakes investigations into matters which resulted in death, assaults including sexual assaults and damage to property or taking of money by a member(s) of the Security Force. Consequently, there is no proper complaint before the Commission.

RK, the complainant, stated that on Thursday January 29, 2015 at about 9:00 a.m he was in the process of removing his luggage from a motor vehicle when an officer gave him a traffic ticket for parking in a no parking zone. Mr. RK further said he took his driver's licence but not the ticket from the officer and walked away to go catch his flight. While in the airport with his two (2) year old son in his hand, two officers told him that he was under arrest and dragged him by the waist of his pants. He also alleges that Officer 1 removed his firearm from his holster and held it down at one point. The complainant was later charged for using indecent language, assaulting a police officer and resisting arrest.

The police however allege that on the day in question, Constable 1 approached the complainant because he was in breach of the Airport Authority Act, namely parking in a No Parking Zone. Constable 1, requested the car documents and his driver's licence and informed him of the aforementioned offence. The complainant uttered abusive remarks towards him. He requested assistance. Constables 1 and 2 soon arrived on the scene and they also warned him to desist from using indecent language. Constable 1 ticketed him, and handed the ticket, car documents and the driver's licence to the man, but he aggressively took his licence only from the officer and walked to the Check in Counter. The officers approached him with the view of arresting him for using indecent language. He violently resisted arrest. After attempting to restrain Mr. RK, he was eventually carried to the police station, where he was charged for using indecent language, assaulting a police officer and resisting arrest.

The complainant, **OT**, alleges that on June 12, 2014 he was treated unprofessional by members of the police force. The respondent contends that the complainant was not treated in an unprofessional manner, and that he was dealt with according to law.

The complainant, **SM**, alleges that on June 18, 2015 he was assaulted by a policeman, without lawful justification or excuse, whilst he was visiting the Ocho Rios Police Station. The respondent contends that the complainant was behaving in a boisterous manner, and that he advanced towards him with a clenched fist, so he struck him with a baton three (3) times in order to subdue him.

The complainant alleges that he was shot and injured in Pongside District, Yallahs, St. Thomas on July 18, 2013. However, he is unable to say who shot him. Further, there is no ballistics evidence to assist the Commission in identifying whether the complainant had been shot by the police or the man the police was trying to apprehend when lethal force was used.

The complainant Mr. KD states that on the 13th day of March 2015, he was arrested and taken into custody after being accused and pointed out by another person, as the individual who has earlier fired shots that him (the complainant to the police). As a result of this allegation, he was taken to the Lucea Police Station where he met an officer. Mr. KD alleges that the officer allegedly used a ruler to push against his (Mr. KD's) forehead causing him slight pain. He was thereafter threatened by the officer that he (the officer) would push a knife at his throat (where he had a scar) and that if he subsequently saw him on any raids he would kill him. Sometime afterwards, he also alleges that he was taken to officer 2 who told him that he must kill him. No other person was present when either of these utterances were made.

Corporal 1 states that on the day in question he received reports of Shooting with Intent and was informed that Mr. KD was being held at the Lucea Police Station. He went to the police station where he interviewed an allegedly complainant, Mr. L, who made certain allegations to him. Based on the information received he did not have sufficient information on which to charge Mr. KD therefore he simply warned him to keep the peace and stay away from Mr. L. He thereafter left Mr. KD and return to his other duties. Deputy Superintendent of Police denies threatening the complainant and states that all he said to the complainant, upon being told the allegations against him, was that if he did not desist from shooting at people, gunmen would him and his family. He states further that he knows the complainant well as he is always in conflict with the law.

Ms. B was an inmate at the South Camp Juvenile Correctional and Remand Centre on the 1st day of June, 2014, where she engaged in a fight with Correctional Officer. She states that she fought with the Correctional Officer as the Correctional Officer had attacked her because she slammed a grill and thereafter refused to hand over a needle which he was using to inflict injuries to herself. She further states that when the fracas started she retaliated and hit the CO only because she went under the bed and the CO hit her and slapped her in her face after pulling her out.

CO refuses the allegations of the complainant and states that the complainant was the one who attacked her resulting in her receiving a number of injuries. She recalls that the complainant was being disruptive and boisterous and when she approached the complainant, who has threatened to kill herself, the complainant began attacking her. This version is supported by two other correctional officers, who had to intervene and restrain the complainant.

The complainant, **OH**, alleged that police officers attached to the Portmore Police Station have been harassing him and his brothers. He also alleged that police officers have visited his house on numerous occasions and have searched it. He has also been assaulted and his bike tyres were slashed. The police officers have accused him and his brothers of committing crimes which he denies. They have also been bribed and threatened. Mr. OH believes that he is being harassed by the police officers as they are associated with someone who has interest in buying the house and thus would like him and his brothers out.

The complainant, **DB**, stated that on January 10, 2017 the grille to her family home in Hayes Savannah, Clarendon, was destroyed by a team of police officers who attended her home on an operation in search of Rasta Rambo.

The complainant, **SJ**, a remandee at the South Camp Juvenile Correctional Centre, alleged that on January 17, 2017 she was assaulted by Overseer when she refused to return to her dorm as instructed by the Overseer. She received injuries and was not seen by the doctor until a few days after the incident.

The complainant, **JD**, alleged that on February 12, 2015 he was driving in the Linstead Town when he was stopped by police officers in a marked service vehicle. He was interrogated and a search of his person was conducted. The police officers called a wrecker and during this time he attempted to flee in his vehicle. His car was seized and he was arrested. During his arrest he was assaulted and received injuries. He was charged for Resisting Arrest and Assaulting the Police officer. He was scheduled to appear in the Parish Court on March 4, 2015. His matter was dismissed after two (2) years, sometime in 2017. As a result of his case dismissal, he withdrew his complaint against the concerned officers.

The complainant, **RS**, alleged that on June 25, 2019 he was assaulted by a police officer along Rousseau Road, during a spot check causing him injuries to his face and temporarily impairing his vision. He was then taken to the Half Way Tree Police Station and charged with Disorderly Conduct, Calumnious Language and Resisting Arrest. His matter was placed before the court but thrown out on July 18, 2019. Mr. RS has since withdrawn his complaint.

The complainant, **CC**, an inmate at the Tower Street Adult Correctional Centre, alleged that on August 23, 2016 he was on his way to the bathroom, when he was stopped by Correctional Officer 1, who subsequently assaulted him which resulted in Mr. CC sustaining an injury to his toe.

The complainant, **NC**, alleged that on February 19, 2018 he was at a building which is under construction at Lawrence Tavern Square, when he was assaulted by a police officer who he subsequently learned his name. Mr. NC was arrested and charged for Resisting Arrest and Disorderly Conduct. He received bail. The assault resulted in an injury to his mouth which was treated by Dr.TCH.

The complainant, **LD**, reported that on January 8, 2016, her house was burned down by police officers. She alleges that police officers, murdered her son on October 23, 2012.

The inmate Mickey Simpson was an inmate in the Tower Street Adult Correctional Centre from August 8, 2016. On April 28, 2017 doctors at the Tower Street Adult Correctional Centre confirmed that inmate Mickey Simpson had HIV. On August 9, 2017 he was admitted to the Kingston Public Hospital. At 3 pm on August 28, 2017 whilst the nurses were making rounds they found Mickey Simpson to be motionless. Dr. JC pronounced him dead at 3:05 pm. His body was taken to the Kingston Public Hospital Morgue and a report was made to the Denham Town Police Station. Upon post-mortem examination it was revealed that the cause of death was toxoplasmosis and pneumonia due to or as the consequence of Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) infection.

On Thursday, the 30<sup>th</sup> September 2009 at about 9:15 p.m. Sylvester Malcolm and David Malcolm were shot and killed by the police in an alleged shootout. Cons. R, Cpl. A., and Cons. I. were conveying Cons. R. to his home. Whilst travelling along Robins River main road heading towards White House when they received information about suspicious looking men travelling in two separate motorcars along the said road. On reaching the intersection of Robins River and Three Sticks main roads the police party came upon two cars travelling in the opposite direction. The cars were intercepted by the police party and one sped away while the other crashed into the embankment. It is further alleged that five (5) men alighted from the motorcar and opened gunfire at the police party who returned fire. Sgt. C. along with Cons. D. who were on their way home in Sgt. C's private motorcar came upon the shooting. They joined their colleagues and a shootout ensued. After the shooting subsided three of the five men were seen lying in the road suffering from gunshot wounds. The other two men escaped. One AK47 rifle with 12 rounds 7.62 cartridges was recovered. The injured men were taken to the Savanna-la-Mar Hospital where they were pronounced dead.

On Saturday, March 25, 2017 at about 2:30 a.m., Sergeant F, Detective Constable A and Constable Z responded to a burglary in the Culloden area in Westmoreland. The team of officers saw a Toyota Allion motor car, alleged to have been stolen from CQ in Culloden District, Westmoreland, driving unto the Bluefields main road area. The officers followed the car unto Brighton main road where they saw four men dressed in dark clothing alight from the car. The men allegedly ran into a section believed to be a cow pasture, where they opened fire at the police officers. It is further alleged that the police officers took evasive action and returned fire. It is not known if any of the men were hit during the exchange of gun fire. None of the officers were injured. The car in which the men were travelling was seized and taken to Whitehouse Police Station. Two flat screen televisions were also recovered, along with a Blu cell phone, a gold chain valued at two hundred thousand (\$200,000) Jamaican dollars, one HP laptop, and a wrist watch valued at US fifty dollars (\$50).

On April 2, 2019 about 9:10 am, he was driving marked police Toyota Corolla motor car registered CSS06 in the right lane of the dual carriage way along Nelson Mandela Highway, in a Westerly direction about 45 kilometres per hour. On reaching the vicinity of the Union Estate Housing Scheme, he saw an elderly man suddenly appear in the middle of the road. The said elderly man ran in front of the car while he was driving on the right side of the roadway. Based on his observations, the man ran behind a passing vehicle that was in the left lane and continued running across the road without paying attention to the service vehicle and other vehicles. Immediately after seeing the man, he swerve to the right in an attempt to avoid hitting the man with the car. Despite swerving to the right, the man collided into the left front section of the car and he fell to the ground. Inspector then stopped, exited the car and with assistance of members of the public, placed the man inside the car. Inspector transported the man to Spanish Town Hospital where he was admitted in an unconscious state. Later he was informed that the injured man died and was identified as Mr. Lloyd Boothe, a 75 years old retired police officer of a Central Village address.

The complainant JN states that on July 22, 2019 he was in the company of two relatives and friends, when a man he knows as 'G' approached him and told him the police were at his home looking for him. While walking back to his home, upon reaching Allanby Crescent, he observed a police vehicle approaching them and upon reaching them, two male officers exited the vehicle and 'G' pointed him out to them. One of the officers who is of dark complexion draped him in the front of his shirt and pushed him against the police vehicle and used his finger nails to dig into the area between his neck and shoulder. He removed the officer's fingers from himself and the said officer pushed him in his chest pushing him into the police vehicle. His brother was then pointed out to the police and was being manhandled by the other officer who is of brown complexion. He asked this officer why he was treating his brother in that manner and this officer boxed him on the left side of his face. Before allowing his brother and himself to leave, the brown officer threatened to take their lives.

The complainant, Ms. JW states that on September 2, 2019 at about 12 midday she was at home, when she saw about three Policemen dressed in bullet proof vest walked into her room. She said she saw T standing and she heard Officer 2 asked T his name. Ms. JW said that he told the Police his name and alias, at which time said Officer 2 told him that they came for him for suspicion of murder. Ms. JW said that she saw her grandmother hold unto T and saw Officer 2 hold her grandmother by the neck and pushed her away and told her to go one side. At this point, according to Ms. JW, she intervened and tried to push Officer 2 off her grandmother but Officer 2 pushed her away. Ms. JW said that Officers 1, 2 and 4 were hitting and dragging T. Ms. JW said Officer 1 pursued her into the house, held unto her and began to drag her and told her that he was taking her to jail. He dragged her to the car T was in and placed her to sit beside him. They then took T from the car and back into the house. When they returned with T he had a shirt over his head and a wound which bled on his right hand. They both were taken to the Portmore Police Station where she was charged with offences to include Obstructing the Police.

The complainant Mr. DR said that he was at a premises at Hannah Street when three men in a Red Toyota Corolla passed him three times. The third time they stopped and ordered him out of the premises. They told him that he should meet them at the Allman Town Police Station which is within walking distance from where he was. It was at that time that he realized that the men were police officers. On his way to the Police Station he was allegedly assaulted by all three officers.

The complainant Ms. NM states that on Friday November 11, 2016 at about 3:30 a.m. she went to a disco club on Strand Street, Montego Bay, St. James with her friend 'F'. She said that she left her bag with a bartender who kept it behind the counter. She said that at about 4:30 she decided that she was going to leave the club and collected her bag from the bartender. Upon placing her purse in the bag and removing a small knife which she walks with on the road for protection, the security guard came and attacked her. Ms. NM said that the security used his hands to hit her on her face and multiple times in her head. A man then came and pulled away the security at which point he remarked that he was a police officer so he could do what he wants. The complainant said that during the incident the knife was on a table and there was nothing in her hands. She said that a friend later told her that the security at the club is known as 'SB'. She reported the matter at the Barnett Street Police Station and also sought medical attention at a health Care Facility on Creek Street for her headache which was caused by the incident.

On March 19, 2019, Navada Dennis was shot and killed along Island Farm Lane, Gutters district, Bushy Park, St. Catherine. It is reported that on the day in question, Cons. attended a colleague's birthday party in the Island Farm community and whilst there he met up with a female companion called 'M' whom he knew for about 2-3 months. After conversing with 'M' for a few hours at the party she was ready to go home and he walked with her down the lane towards her home. The now deceased Dennis and 'M' were involved romantically, and when he saw 'M' and Cons. walking together in the direction of her home, he trailed them down the lane. Whilst walking down the lane, Dennis attacked 'M', hitting her at the back of her head and grabbing her hand. Cons. intervened and Dennis used a pointed object to stab at him. Cons. attempted to block the attack with his hand and ended up being stabbed in the left hand. Dennis raised his hand with the pointed object to stab Cons. again and, in fear for his life, Cons. quickly drew his service pistol and discharged a round. Dennis was shot and taken to the Spanish Town Hospital where succumbed to his injury.

On May 1, 2016, sometime after 4:00 a.m., Mr. Delroy Doyley, inmate at the May Pen Police Station lockups, fell unconscious in the holding area of the station and was assisted by fellow inmates and police personnel into a service vehicle and transported to the May Pen Hospital where he was pronounced dead shortly after arriving. The pathologist, ruled that the cause of death was congestive heart failure and cardiomegaly.

On February 1, 2018, at about 7:30 a.m., inmate Christopher Brown was found inside his cell hanging from an electrical cable tied to the ventilation grille above the cell door. The deceased's body was discovered by fellow inmate who immediately notified the concerned correctional officer. CO contacted the medical orderly, who quickly visited the cell and cut the cable lowering the body of the deceased inmate. Inmate Brown was placed onto a stretcher and inside a department ambulance and rushed to the Kingston Public Hospital where he was pronounced dead.

On July 5, 2019, 14-year-old Tyrice Williams was walking across the Bernard Lodge Main Road when he was struck by a white Toyota Succeed motor car driven by Constable. Master Williams was flung into the air by the impact and landed on the left embankment. Cons. and onlookers assisted in placing the injured Williams into a motor car and rushed him to the Spanish Town Hospital where he was pronounced dead shortly after arriving.

On Saturday, 2016 July 23 about 5:15 a.m. along Lyndhurst Road Cpl. was sitting in the front passenger seat of a green Toyota Belta, his friend, Mr. CD was standing on the outside ordering food when they were pounced upon by two (2) men armed, one armed with a firearm and who demanded their properties. Cpl. who was armed with licence firearm & Magazine of 16 rounds took evasive action out of fear for his life and discharged one round in the direction of the men who ran and escaped in the area. Cpl. subsequently attended the Half Way Tree Police Station and made a report. Sometime after one AR turned up at the Kingston Public Hospital suffering from a gunshot wound to the rectum. Upon investigation one spent casing was found inside the vehicle.

The complainant alleged that she was verbally abused and threatened by two police officers who visited her house looking for her son.

The complainant said her son has been arrested by the police and charged with the murder of Constable Lynden Barrett. She said she saw him with bruises all over his body at Kingston Public Hospital in the custody of the police on the day of his arrest. On Sunday August 23, 2015, she visited the Gun Court Remand Centre where she saw her son and he told her that he was beaten by the police. She was also given a prescription and a form for her son to do an ultrasound and he told her his nose was broken.

The police report that on January 09, 2013 about 3:20 pm, five police officers were on observation mobile patrol in an unmarked Toyota Hiace service vehicle in the Duncan Pen Community. A group of men were observed standing at a gate acting suspiciously. On approach of the men the service vehicle came to a sudden stop and Constable A alighted from the vehicle and shouted, "The man in the grey t-shirt have a gun". The other officers then exited the vehicle. Constable A shouted "police don't move". The police claimed that Clive pointed a gun in the direction of Constable A and three other men standing with Clive pointed in the direction of the other policemen. Constable M in response opened fire with an MP5 sub machine gun at the men and Clive fell to the ground. A and M carried Clive to the service vehicle and rushed him to the Spanish Town Public Hospital. Whilst on route to the hospital, M claimed to have conducted a preliminary search of the man's person and removed from his pants pocket three .38 cartridges, which he immediately brought to Corporal's attention.

DB, 16 year old International Academy of Excellence student was allegedly beaten by four (4) police officers in Half Way Tree and accused of having a gun. One of the officers was identified as Constable A. The beating stopped when a police woman intervened and told the policemen that people could see them through the window at the Half Way Tree Transport Centre. She then got the particulars for D's mother, AW, and called her. They then went to the Half Way Tree Police Station where a report was made in the Station Diary.

Report of this incident came through INDECOM's Head Office and Trelawny Divisional Headquarters on August 29, 2012. Information received is that on Monday, August 27, 2012 Inspector of the Wakefield Police Station acting upon certain information went to the barracks room of Constable about 11:50 p.m. He asked if he had a female in his room, initially he said, "No", then he allowed the female to come out. Insp. recognized the female to be, 15 years old SJ of the same community. She was handed over to Detective Sergeant and Woman Constable. The underwear and bed linen of Constable were also handed over to them.

CM was arrested and the Hunts Bay Police Station. Whilst conducting an interview it was alleged that she began to behave in a disorderly manner. She was warned of her behavior, after which she began to throw items from her bag all over the room whilst hurling expletives. In response, Constable employed his pepper spray.

It is alleged that a team of police officers went in search of persons of interest and illegal firearms in the Old Harbour Bay area when the complainant pulled a firearm at the police and fired at them. The fire was returned and the man dropped the gun and ran. The gun was recovered and when a search of the area was conducted it was realized that the man was injured. The injured man was taken to the hospital where he underwent surgery and admitted. The man was identified as KH. The following day Mr. KH escaped custody from the Spanish Town Hospital, he however returned where, he remained admitted (although according to his father it was he, the father, who took him back to the hospital).
