Social Intervention Report

(September 1, 2017- June 10, 2020)

This Honourable House is being requested to note that after the enactment of the Law Reform (Zones of Special Operations) (Special Security and Community Development Measures) Act, the Prime Minister acting on the advice of the National Security Council declared Mount Salem the first Zone of Special Operations (ZOSO) on September 1, 2017.

Since the declaring of the zone, the Social Intervention Committee (SIC) has coordinated the implementation of a myriad of social services to the community. These Social Intervention are guided by a development framework approved by Cabinet and serves as a developmental roadmap with under seven pillars:

- i) Transformation of the Physical Environment;
- ii) Land Tenure (Land regularization);
- iii) Community Safety (Improvement in citizen perception);
- iv) Human and Community Development and Employment (Livelihood and skill development);
- v) Business and Economic Development,
- vi) Spiritual and Faith Based Intervention and;
- vii) Leadership.

The Social Intervention has been anchored in the Build Phase since February 2018 and since that period there have been significant achievements with respect to services deployed in the community, and an overall improvement in community safety and security, which have been anchored in the following theoretical approach:

1. Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)
2. Crime Prevention through Social Development (CPTSD)

SUMMARY OF KEY SUCCESSES IN THE ZONE:

Developments within the zone over the last three years have achieved most of the quantitative and qualitative targets. These include:

1. Significant infrastructure works completed for roads and drainage effecting the entire community, with direct beneficiary of over 4000 residents;
2. Improvement in basic utilities including regularization of NWC for over 500 residents;
3. Over 4000 meters of roadway affected and eight (8) of nine (9) lanes completed; and
4. Skills training, and other soft initiatives including summer camps, and programmes to address literacy and numeracy completed benefitting over 150 youth.

The approximate cumulative value of projects executed in the community to date is in excess of J\$185M.

NEW ACTIVITIES SINCE REPORT ON APRIL 9, 2020 IN MOUNT SALEM

1. New round of vector control and community sanitization, with over 16 truckloads of non-household garbage removed from the community during the period.
2. Advanced procurement selection of a contractor to execute the rehabilitation of the community centre.
3. One additional roadway (Coconut Palm) in the community was paved.
4. Over 200 residents were supported with care packages through partnership with the Private Sector Organization of Jamaica (PSOJ), the St James Police and the Mount Salem Community Development Committee (CDC).
5. Printed materials were delivered to over 50 students on an ongoing basis to supplement their online and distance learning following COVID-19 school closures. This programme will be continued to facilitate and support a further number of 200 students.

PENDING PROJECTS - WORKS

The most significant project that remains pending for implementation are the:

1. The Mount Salem Primary and Infant School - Design works are completed, however, following consultations with the Ministry of Education, further amendments are being done to the proposed design and scope of works, which has shifted the timeline for tendering activities. Development and implementation are now earmarked for 2020. The project is to be funded by the Jamaica Social Investment Fund (JSIF) through the Caribbean Development Bank BNTF. The project remains inactive.
2. Mount Salem Police Station and Health Centre – Mount Salem Police Station was tendered and is currently being evaluated. This rehabilitation will be funded through the EU Poverty Reduction Programme. The budget is in place and pending EU final approval. This project remains under active consideration for implementation in 2020.


